The Institute Earns ACPEinc Accreditation

In February 2019, The Denver Institute for Psychoanalysis received notice of accreditation from the Accreditation Council for Psychoanalytic Education, Inc. (ACPEinc) an independent, nonprofit organization which has been providing accreditation since 2001 to foster excellence in psychoanalytic education. The ACPEinc joined by the American Association for Psychoanalytic Education (AAPE) conducted an evaluation of the Denver Institute for Psychoanalysis in Fall 2018.

The American Association for Psychoanalytic Education (AAPE) is an independent, non-profit standards organization that fosters excellence in psychoanalytic education by establishing, promoting, and maintaining standards for psychoanalytic education in member institutes and centers with a focus on educational quality and content. AAPE achieves its goals by means of periodic review of standards, site visits, and consultations.

Upon conclusion of the site visit, Drs. Howard Foster and John Gilkey stated, "the Denver Institute for Psychoanalysis ought to be praised for their encouraging of candidates and faculty to continue to grow as analysts and to value outside assessment following graduation".

The Denver Institute for Psychoanalysis, incorporated in 1969, has been offering psychoanalytic education since 1956. It is organized for the purpose of providing psychoanalytic education and to encourage application of psychoanalytic knowledge to relevant fields of study and practice. At the Denver Institute for Psychoanalysis, qualified professionals may pursue full training in adult psychoanalysis, child & adolescent psychoanalysis, or both. Alternatively, a two-year training program in adult psychodynamic psychotherapy is available.



"We are extremely pleased to have achieved this designation," stated Barbara Redinger, Institute Director 2016-2019, "Accreditation is a rigorous process, but one that we welcome as a continual quality improvement mechanism. Earning ACPEinc accreditation is another measure of our excellence as a provider of psychoanalytic education and reflects our commitment to our candidates and the community."

The Denver Institute for Psychoanalysis joins twelve other psychoanalytic institutes accredited by the ACPEinc in the United States.

First Graduating Class

Before the Denver Institute for Psychoanalysis was founded in 1969 and before receiving approval from APsaA to become an approved training facility in 1972, aspiring psychoanalysts from the Denver area would commute to Chicago every other weekend for classes and supervision starting in the late 1950s. The Chicago Institute for Psychoanalysis accommodated candidates from Denver, Cincinnati, and St. Louis by offering a five year curriculum with classes meeting on Fridays and Saturdays every other week for a total of 18 weeks a year.

The Chicago Institute for Psychoanalysis granted several Denver analysts as geographic training and supervising analysts, allowing candidates the ability to meet with analysts locally to talk about their cases.

The last commuter class began in 1967 and graduated in 1972, just in time for Denver to hold its first local class.

Institute Programs & Services

ANALYTIC PROGRAM

Candidates develop their clinical psychoanalytic skills by psychoanalyzing three patients, at a frequency of 4-5 sessions per week, with weekly supervision by three different supervisors, while attending didactic classes and undergoing their own personal analysis. Completing this intensive post-graduate educational program allows candidates to become eligible for professional certification through the ABPsa.

TEACHING RESIDENTS

The Psychodynamic Psychotherapy Training (PPT Program) track provides an introduction to the principals of psychodynamic psychotherapy for psychiatric residents, as well as psychology and social work interns at the University of Colorado School of Medicine, by practicing psychoanalysts who have gone through the process of appointment to the Clinical Faculty of the University of Colorado School of Medicine. While not an Institute program, our faculty provides coursework, case discussions, and supervision for these students free of charge through the three years of the resident's training.

Many graduates of the training programs from the University of Colorado and other accredited universities continue their training after graduation with us in our psychoanalytic and psychotherapy training programs.

MENTORING

The Mentorship Program offers psychoanalytically oriented mentoring to psychiatric residents and child fellows in training through the Department of Psychiatry, University of Colorado School of Medicine. The program is also available to other licensed clinicians from the disciplines of psychology and social work. Members of the faculty of the Denver Institute for Psychoanalysis serve as mentors and meet with their mentees on an individual basis to discuss aspects of psychoanalytically informed psychotherapy including clinical cases, specific topics in psychodynamics, relevant papers, and career and training options.

FACULTY DEVELOPMENT

Faculty development is an important component in the ongoing growth of our teachers and administrators. Aside from teaching, research and service, faculty development promotes faculty responsibility as well as the understanding of instructional concepts, current trends and teaching processes that can be expanded and deepened. Since 1976 the Institute has provided a wide range of topics (listed on previous page) to the faculty members. Although professional development is often viewed as supplementary, a majority of the faculty participate.

PSYCHODYNAMIC PSYCHOTHERAPY PROGRAM

The Psychoanalytic Therapies Program is a two-year certificate program that was launched in 1992 for licensed psychiatrists, psychologists or social workers who want to advance their skills, but do not wish to do full psychoanalytic training.

The aim of the program is to improve clinical skills and to demonstrate the usefulness of applying contemporary psychoanalytic thinking to a wide range of clinical, teaching, and consultative situations.

LOW FEE REFERRAL SERVICE

The Psychoanalytic Clinic was started in 1963 to provide psychoanalytic treatment for patients accepted for supervised psychoanalysis. It functions as a referral service providing evaluations for the community relating to suitability for psychoanalytic treatment as well as informing and educating health professionals and the community about psychoanalysis. In 1988, the Clinic was expanded to include the evaluation and psychoanalytic treatment of children and adolescents.

Patients accepted through the referral service have their treatment conducted by analysts-in-training, experienced psychotherapists who are under the supervision of senior members of the Institute faculty, or faculty members who wish to take on a low fee case. The fee is scaled to the patient's ability to pay.

In 2015 the name was changed to the Psychoanalytic Referral Service.

PIZZA & PSYCHOANALYSIS

Pizza & Psychoanalysis began in the fall of 2013 at the Graduate School of Professional Psychology at the University of Denver. The PsyD students who were taking a course in psychodynamic psychotherapy taught by Dr. Shoshana Adler, PhD wanted to learn more and as a result, Dr. Adler and Joshua Burg, a student coordinator from the class developed a quarterly program where a variety of psychoanalysts present.

During the last 6 years, twenty analysts have spoken on analytic topics and two additional students have coordinated the program. Six to twenty students attended each meeting.

LIBRARY

With the passing of Dr. Herbert Gaskill and the uncertainty of the CPH Spitz library, in 1994 the Institute decided to turn Dr. Gaskill's office into a library and lounge to house important documents and memorabilia and allow the space to provide a center for candidates, students and faculty to come together. Books from Drs. Herbert Gaskill, Gretl Hitchman, Herb Kritzer and Joan Fleming were the first 400 to line the shelves. An online library and checkout system is being utilized to catalog the books and checkouts. Unfortunately from September 2017-2022 much of the library is in storage until our next move.

JOHN D. BENJAMIN AWARD

The John D. Benjamin Award was established by the Institute and the Society to commemorate Dr. John D. Benjamin's lifelong commitment to the advancement of child psychoanalysis and his pioneering interest in child development. Dr. Benjamin was a Psychiatrist at the UC School of Medicine from 1935 to 1965 who conducted pioneering research in child development in conjunction with the Department of Pediatrics. ROBERT EMDE AWARD

This award was established in recognition of Dr. Emde's outstanding accomplishments and commitment to the advancement of psychoanalysis as a science. Thus, the Robert Emde fund was established to support psychoanalytic research efforts and/or scholarly work that contributes to the scientific advancement of psychoanalysis. Typically, the cash award will be \$500.00. However, under certain circumstances, the awards committee may decide to grant larger sums to support empirical psychoanalytic research. Accreditation

Accreditation is a process of validation in which colleges, university and institutes are evaluated. The aim is to protect the public by ensuring certain standards are being met.

The Denver Institute for Psychoanalysis received accreditation by the ACPEinc in 2019. Its accreditation process works to assure that training institutions implement Standards in their education and training of candidates.



Standards

Professional standards are a set of practices, ethics, and behaviors that members of a particular body must adhere to.

The Institute follows the standards set forth by the American Association for Psychoanalytic Education (AAPE) for education and training of psychoanalysts which includes

- 450 hours course work
- 3+ supervised clinical cases of different genders
- A case presentation/scholarly paper or both.



Board Certification

Board Certification in psychoanalysis is a voluntary process by which a therapist demonstrates through blind peer review a mastery of basic knowledge and skills necessary to practice the profession of psychoanalysis.

Graduates of the Institute's analytic program are eligible to become Board Certified by the American Board of Psychoanalysis.

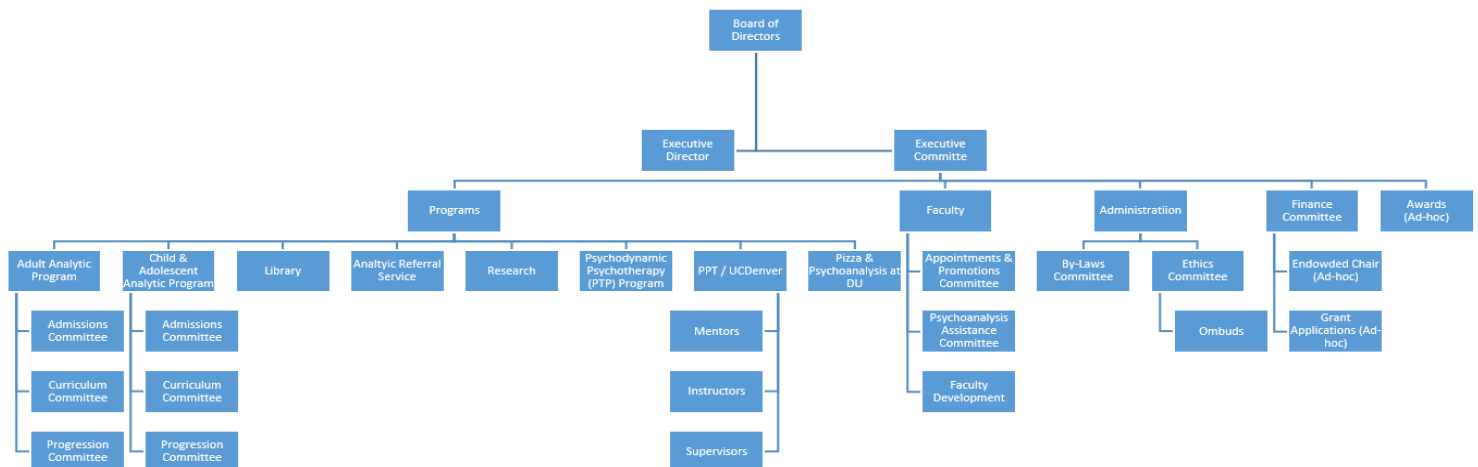

What do Training & Supervising Analysts do?

Training & Supervising Analysts are board certified by APsaA or ABPsa. Training & Supervising Analysts serve vital roles in candidates' education and maintain fundamental psychoanalytic standards for education and practice. Candidates are required to have at least 200 hours of supervision, and work with a minimum of 3 supervisors before they can graduate.

Training and Supervising Analysts responsibilities are in two crucial aspects of psychoanalytic education in the candidate's personal analysis and supervision of the candidate's control cases.

The Herbert Gaskill Society

Recruited to chair the Department of Psychiatry in 1952, Dr. Gaskill envisioned a psychoanalytic institute in Denver. Just a year later, his intelligence and energy were devoted to building a first-rate department of psychiatry with energies equally divided in clinical and research for the ultimate establishment of an Institute for Psychoanalysis. He recruited experienced analysts to join him to teach in the Department and to provide supervision and therapy. The Denver Institute for Psychoanalysis was established in 1969. Dr. Gaskill's generosity, modesty, strength, and endless questioning were a model for the psychoanalytically-informed life.

Timeline

- 1856 Sigmund Freud was born. In 1896 he coined the term psychoanalysis
- 1907 The Vienna Psychoanalytic Society was formed (later became the International Psychoanalytic Association)
- 1938 John & Hertha Benjamin move to Denver. Ten years later in 1948 Jule Eisnbud, MD moves to Denver
- 1953 Herbert Gaskill, MD arrives in Denver. Dr. Gaskill took the position of Department Chair of the Psychiatry Department of the University of Colorado and had a vision of creating a psychoanalytic institute in Denver
- 1956 Psychoanalytic Education begins in Denver
- 1962 The Denver Psychoanalytic Society is formed
- 1963 The Psychoanalytic Clinic is established
- 1968 The Denver Institute for Psychoanalysis planning is underway. The first Institute retreat was held.
- 1969 The Denver Institute for Psychoanalysis was granted provisional status by the American Psychoanalytic Association and the Institute's Articles of Incorporation was signed.
- 1970 The IRS recognizes the Denver Institute for Psychoanalysis as a 501c3 nonprofit organization
- 1972 The American Psychoanalytic Association grants the Denver Institute for Psychoanalysis an Approved Institute for psychoanalytic education
- 1974 The Denver Psychoanalytic Society publishes its first newsletter. The Institute celebrates its first graduates
- 1985 An Affiliation Agreement between the Denver Institute for Psychoanalysis and the Department of Psychiatry at the University of Colorado is signed
- 1988 The Child & Adolescent Analytic Training Program is established
- 1992 The Denver Psychoanalytic Society started a Psychodynamic Psychotherapies class. The EEC was formed
- 1994 Institute library is formed following the death of Dr. Gaskill
- 1997 The Institute established its first Award, named after the first recipient, Brandt F. Steele
- 1998 Members of the Denver Institute for Psychoanalysis commute to Minneapolis to provide guidance and help set up the new Minneapolis Institute
- 2004 A two-year Child & Adolescent Child & Adolescent Psychodynamic Psychotherapies Program is started. Dr. Sydney Margolin donated her father's analytic couch. The Institute & Society launched a website.
- 2005 The Psychodynamic Psychotherapies programs is moved under the Denver Institute for Psychoanalysis

- 2010 Institute Board of Directors is formed
- 2015 The Institute & Society create a social media presence through facebook and twitter and the Institute joins the Community First Foundation and creates a logo a year later in 2016
- 2019 The Denver Institute for Psychoanalysis is granted ACPEinc Accreditation

The Denver Institute for Psychoanalysis is organized for the purpose of providing psychoanalytic education for qualified applicants, to advance scholarship and research in the science of psychoanalysis, and to encourage application of psychoanalytic knowledge to relevant fields of study and practice.
